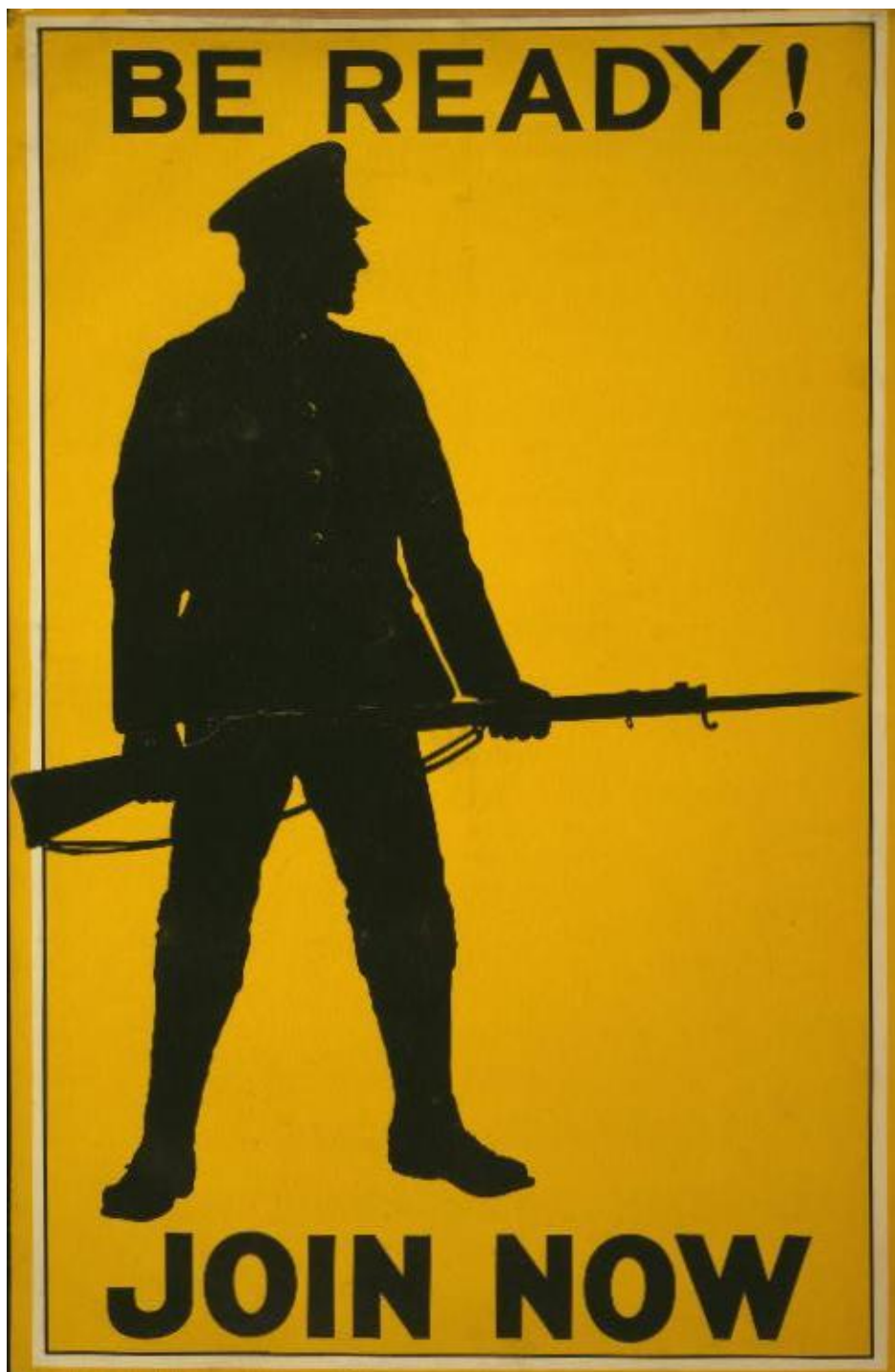

Inevitably, there were occasions when several men from the three congregations died in the same battles and often on the same day:

Battle of Loos – two men from the three congregations died on 25th September 1915 and another two from the three congregations men died on 23rd and 24th November 1915.

Battle of the Somme – seven men from the three congregations died between 1st July and 5th July 1916.

Battle of Langemarck (Third Ypres) – seven men from the three congregations died on 16th and 17th August 1917.

Battle of St. Quentin – three men from the three congregations, including two from the same battalion of the Royal Irish Rifles, died on 21st March 1918.

Battle of Cambrai – Two men from the three congregations died on 22nd November 1917.
